

SOCIETY MEETING MINUTES

May 12, 2014 Recorded by GLMS Secretary, Dave Fryauff

The May 12, 2014, meeting was called to order by President Chris Luzier at 7:45 pm, with approximately (45 adults + 9 youth + 3 children) people attending. It was M/S/A to approve the minutes of the April 14, 2014 regular and the April 21, 2014 BOD meetings. Members took part in a silent auction of books on geology, gemology, and minerals. These books were donated by Flo-Ann Bowen, in memory of Gil.

Eastern Federation (EFMLS): Wendell Mohr brought to GLMS-MC members attention that the Wildacres Workshop scheduled for Sep. 1-7 is in serious jeopardy of being discontinued unless there members interested in attending. For a very reasonable tuiton cost of \$390 those who do attend will receive outstanding training in: 1) Rocks & Minerals, 2) Plate Tectonics, and 3) A basic introduction to cabochons. It was suggested that the GLMS-MC BOD take this matter up at the upcoming BOD meeting and consider whether we can award scholarships to youth members who are interested in attending.

Field Trips: Jonathan Harris announced that he would be working on plans for a summer field trip to the Churchville Quarry in Harford Co., MD. He requested that members use their initiative and contacts to find other new places for field trips. A suggestion was made for a field trip to West Virginia, and a number of members have knowledge of good sites in WV for fossils and minerals.

Treasurer's Report (Holly McNeil): We have a positive cash flow of \$6069

Visitors: George, Lucas, and Anna Corbin were welcomed as new members.

Vice President (Dave Tiktinsky): Informed members that the special auction in June would require that participating members follow a "special protocol" and procedures adopted from the NOVA club. Members were emailed the details and specific forms to use. The auction limit is 10 items/member.

Presentation: VP Dave Tiktinsky introduced Jim Kostka, whose entire adult life (and profession) has been dedicated radiation safety in a company that specializes in the development, production, and marketing of radioactive substances for use in science and medicine. For this reason, Jim has greater understanding than any other member of GLMS-MC in radiation risks and ways to mitigate such risks. He also has a keen interest and knowledge of radioactive minerals, many of which are among the rarest and most beautiful in the mineral kingdom. Jim's presentation, entitled "Uranium Mineralization Concepts and Systematic Classification of Uranium Minerals", began by explaining that the element Uranium, at 2.4 parts per million in the earth's crust is more common than Silver, Gold, Arsenic, Mercury, Molybdenum, Tungsten, and Tin, which we often think of as relatively common. Uranium and its radioactivity in the earth's center is largely responsible for maintaining the core in its hot and molten state. Volcanic activity and alkaline granitic intrusions bring uranium to the earth's surface where it is leached by water and acidic conditions and concentrated in swamps. The Triassic-age Culpeper basin of Virginia is an example of a uranium-rich geologic zone that was once swampland. Mining of primary uranium minerals such as uraninite, coffinite, and pitchblend presents a problem because water and acidic conditions oxidize the primary uranium minerals to secondary minerals that are much more easily solubilized and potentially hazardous to plant and animal life. Jim introduced members to the different classes of secondary uranium and showed some beautiful microphotography, most of which was produced by former GLMS-MC member Patrick Haynes, who also specializes in the collection of these minerals and has the rare uranium selenite haynesite named after him.

Prizes: Junior prize of a combination specimen of greenockite and marcasite on galena was won by Claire Desalvo. The Show Table winner of a glistening black cabinet size piece of Goethite from Linden, Texas was also Claire DeSalvo. The general Door Prize of a silver pendant with a polished Labradorite (a variety of the Ca-rich feldspar mineral Anorthite) was Rod Towers

May 19, 2014 Recorded by GLMS Secretary, Dave Fryauff

The May 19, 2014 GLMSMC BOD meeting was called to order by President, Chris Luzier at 7:32 pm. Wendell Mohr prepared and emailed a list of agenda items for discussion to BOD members which formed the night's BOD agenda.

Board members present: Andy Celmer, Dave Fryauff, Jonathan Harris, Chris Luzier, Holly McNeil, Wendell Mohr, Andy Muir, Pat Repik-Byrne, Joel Rosen, and David Tiktinsky. Board members absent: Doug Baum and Rod Towers.

Editor: Jonathan Harris is doing a great job as "compiler" in addition to his regular duties
 Status 2013 Audit: Holly McNeil provided copies of the GLMS-MC "Suggested Audit Program" to all board members.

3. Updated Roster: A decline in membership was noted and the implications discussed.

4. Rockville Science Center (RSC) appeal for funds: Discussed long-term goal of the RSC to obtain its own building and possibility of GLMS-MC support.

5. Wildacres: Scheduled for Sep. 1-7 with three instructors; tuition cost of \$350. Lots of talk about the possible loss of the Wildacres learning experience & the critical situation this program is in. It was M/S/P to fund full tuition to 3 ea. paid-registered adult GLMS-MC members who worked at the March 2014 Annual Show and their children over 12 yrs old. This offer is even open to those who have previously attended Wildacres

6. EFMLS Directory pdf is available for Officers: Hardcopy or pdf is available with information on every club within EFMLS. If interested contact Carolyn Weinberger.

7. Annual show publicity: Discussed the critical timing factor and need to send out early material at least 4 months in advance. Need to get publicity and announcement fliers ready, finalized, and printed in time for the September 2014 meeting of the Gem Cutters Guild. Discussion of useful databases held by Jim Kostka & George Durland for contact & distribution of posters & fliers. Doug Baum to consider need for updating the 2015 Annual Show posters & fliers & send out this material 4 months in advance of the show.

8. Show Chairmanship assistance: Discussion of the need for separate chairmen for Exhibits & Demonstrators. Wendell Mohr volunteered to prepare Vouchers & Certificates

9. June BOD Meeting: A number of board members not available

10. Lynn Balcheck honorarium and GLMSMC membership: Regular meeting speaker? There was favorable board member discussion of Lynn Balchek's service in educating youth members toward their achievement of the Stone Age Tool & Art badge and the appropriateness of having her present on archaeology as a topic at one of the regular monthly meetings. It was also M/S/P to award guest speakers at youth meetings of the Future Rockhounds of America (FRA) and regular GLMS-MC meetings with Honorary GLMS-MC membership and an honorarium drawn from the Turner fund.

11. Mohr's show critique. Wendell Mohr led a discussion that recognized the good things that made the March 2014 show highly successful ("The best ever") and a number of issues that could and/or should be addressed to make the 2015 show even better:

- The 2014 show had no announcement or publicity in either the MC Gazette (Gaithersburg edition), or in the Montgomery Village News. (Doug later notes in email: there was an announcement in the March 12 2014 Gazette listed as Best Bet for the weekend and in Gazette.net Community Calendar)
- The trailer has leakage that could ruin the interior contents. Do we need 2 trailers?
- We used all available extension cords and probably need more
- Lights & wiring on older cases may be hazardous
- We need a complete listing of every name, every duty related to work at the show
- Bring back the flint knappers
- Bring back the hospitality table
- USPS gold exhibit pulled out too early
- This year's security guard could have been more helpful
- Need a special show meeting
- There were unclaimed adult (5) & child (1) door prizes
- Will we be prepared with enough cab material for the 2015 show?
- OK for GLMS-MC members to sell on the 1st floor
- Table draping problems
- Fewer cases were exhibited this year than last
- Need to fully equip & police cab section to insure that all protective gear (aprons, eye protection) is available & used by GLMS-MC instructors & the public
- Need to sign in junior members separate from senior members
- Noise/Loudness factor was a detracting feature in one of the 2014 exhibits
- Members need to know exact measures of the old & new cases to insure proper construction of their exhibits
- Flowers & Plaque were a nice touch
- No contract locked in for the 2015 March 21-22 show dates
- A complaint of spam on volunteer Spot
- Too many chairs
- Conrad Smith Eagle Project was good
- MNCA micromounters exhibit was better than last year

12. Treasurer report: Holly McNeill reported that the two recent silent auctions for books netted \$80.00. Not all books were sold and the remainder will be stored and set out at next year's show. Wendell Mohr reported that he has an additional 4 boxes of books and magazines.
