January Speaker: Jeri Jones

Title of talk:

Did Geology Affect the Gettysburg Campaign and How Golden is Southeastern Pennsylvania?

The largest battle fought on United States soil occurred north of the Mason-Dixon Line in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. Thousands of troops representing the Union and Confederate armies battled for three days in very hot and humid temperatures. From the Confederate movement through South Mountain to the west; the day 2 fighting around Devil's Den; Little Round Top; and finally, Pickett's Charge, geology played a huge role in deciding the victory for the Union. The higher ground and rocky surfaces on the battlefield are composed of a hard, very resistant rock known as diabase, which does not allow any trenching to be done for protection. The famous "fish hook" made by the Union outlined these higher elevations. The climax of the battle, Pickett's Charge, saw 15,000 Confederate troops walk off one diabase dike, through the valley of soft rocks, and back up onto another

diabase intrusion at the High Water Mark. Clearly, geology played a role in the decisive battle.

Another glimpse of history will also be covered in this program. The early 1800's discovery of gold in southeastern Pennsylvania created a mini gold rush, well before the North Carolina and California production. Gold has been collected in every county in southeastern Pennsylvania including the town of Philadelphia. Gold miners who were laid off of their jobs along the Great Falls on the Potomac migrated into York County in search of rich gold veins. Bethlehem Steel Company, while operating the famous Cornwall Mines in Lebanon County, discovered gold that they used to their economic benefit. Recreational panners still search the streams in these areas for the precious metal.

Jeri Jones, a native of York, attended Catawba College in North Carolina and earned his degree in Geoarchaeology. Jeri owns Jones Geological Services in Spring Grove, PA, where he studies the geology of southeastern Pennsylvania. With his 37 years of research, Jeri leads groups on field trips and acts as a consultant to several area quarries. He has traveled throughout the country, conducting field trips and programs for all ages. He conducts classes on a regular basis for the OLLI program at Penn State-York. He previously taught at HACC-Gettysburg, York College of Pennsylvania, and Messiah College. He received the Digman Award for Geologic Excellence from the Eastern Chapter of the National Association of Geoscience Teachers. His interests include mining history, geologic history, groundwater resources, and southeastern Pennsylvania earthquakes. He has authored four books, narrated a geologic education video series, and written numerous articles. He is currently an author for the "World Book of Slate" to be published by the London Geological Society in 2017 and a Pennsylvania Geology kids book.

Jeri will be bringing with him CDs for sale; one is his latest book, *TimeWalk*, the geologic history of Adams, Lancaster, and York Counties. The CD is only \$10.00.

Dr. Lance Kearns has invited the GLMSMC and Southern MD clubs down to the James Madison University (JMU) Geology Dept on Saturday, Jan. 7th, 2017 from 9am until noon. The address is Memorial Hall, 395 S. High Street, Harrisonburg, VA, and the entrance to the Geology Department is on Grace Street. There is ample parking along Grace Street and in the Memorial Hall parking lots.

Each year during January and February, Dr. Kearns has invited local MD/DC/VA rock and mineral clubs to the JMU geology labs. A highlight of this visit is a tour of the mineral museum, which showcases some of the most beautiful minerals found in the region, and an outstanding collection of fluorescent minerals from the Franklin and Sterling Hill NJ zinc mines.

Dr. Kearns has an encyclopedic knowledge of minerals and can sight-identify many different mineral species, given accurate information as to where the specimen was found. His laboratories are equipped with instruments for the qualitative and quantitative analysis of pure mineral specimens and he may be able to perform analyses on some of the specimens we bring him.

"The Brand Personality of Rocks: A Critical Evaluation of a Brand Personality Scale"

Abstract

Aaker's (1997) brand personality (BP) scale is widely used in research and is an important foundation for the theory of BP. Building on extant critiques of the scale, this article considers the possibility that Aaker's (1997) scale methodology 'creates' the BP that it measures. Using pictures of rocks as stimuli, this article applies the principles of Aaker's methodology to examine the BP of rocks. Rocks are the chosen stimuli as they do not have any obvious commonalities with brands, or have antecedents to BP formation. Findings revealed that each of the rock stimuli has a distinct BP and that the personality is developed from sometimes surprisingly detailed personifications. In consideration of the importance of Aaker's scale in the development of the BP concept, the findings raise questions about its conceptualization and emphasizes the importance of critical examination of the methods used to measure marketing concepts.






