Speaker: John Weidner

Title of Talk: Silicate Classifications (Why are There So Many Funny Names with "Silicate" in Them?)

What's a nesosilicate? Why should you care? Come to our January meeting and find out!

Our speaker, John Weidner, will describe and define nesosilicates, single-chain silicates, sister silicates, and all those many other funny silicate names. As for caring: Well, after the meeting, if you decide you don't care, you will be able to explain *why* you don't care.

Almost half of the Dana classification of minerals (probably the most commonly-used classification scheme for minerals) are classes of silicates. The classification is based on the chemistry, particularly the chemical elements present, the atomic structure, and the arrangement of those elements into crystals. the plethora of names used, most as synonyms of each other, the classification seems overwhelming, but it all falls into place once a few organizational concepts are explained. All such organizational concepts will be explained in January. Any difficult chemistry will be skipped over, because you don't need to know it to understand the classification of silicates.

Our speaker, John Weidner, is the son of a lawyer and a math major, both fields that are based on precise definitions. This upbringing placed him at a distinct disadvantage in geology and mineral collecting, fields with imprecise categories such a metagreywackie, pseudomorph habits, and sub-vitreous luster. He continues to struggle against this disadvantage today. John completed his PhD in math in 1973. Since then, he has alternated between teaching math in college and designing databases as a subcontractor. He is presently a registered volunteer with the Geology Department at Northern Virginia Community College, although no one, including John, can describe just what he does there. But since most minerals we see commonly in rocks are silicates, he does look at a lot of silicates.


