have the most interest to fluorescent mineral collectors. Also discussed are the mineral clubs and organizations, such as the Franklin Ogdensburg Mineralogical Society (FOMS) and the Fluorescent Mineral Society (FMS) and their respective events through the year, along with night dig events and field trip opportunities as well.

The fluorescent mineral hobby is incredibly accessible to any curious observer, especially at this time more than ever. Technology for ultraviolet lamps is advancing incredibly quickly and lamp prices have become considerably lower with the lamps becoming more and more powerful with the advent of LED technology and other advances. This presentation is an updated version of Chris's original Franklin talk and is loaded with new pictures and information. If you are curious about what all the fluorescent mineral buzz is about, this is the presentation to see and it is the time to start collecting your own fluorescent specimens!!


