"Serpentine Rocks and Chromite Deposits of Maryland and Pennsylvania"

Our January speaker is our member Dave Fryauff, who is our current Field Trip Chairman and a past Secretary.

Speaker Bio: Dave Fryauff

I was born in St. Paul MN on March 15, 1952. My father was a mine engineer who worked for 3M company's industrial minerals division. This branch of 3M had quarries in a bunch of far-flung places like Corona California, Ontario, Canada, Little Rock Arkansas, Belle Meade NJ, and Wausau, Wisconsin. I got to visit a few of these places as a child and it was in Wausau, Wisconsin that I started collecting rocks, minerals, and fossils. I was kind of crazy about fossils, but unhappy because there were no fossils to be had



Speaker Bio: Dave Fryauff

in Wausau or its vicinity. Just the boring old Wausau Pluton pegmatite We had some nice moonstone, smoky quartz, and feldspar....I also found some good zircons. We moved to New Jersey where I started high school and started taking real science classes. Although I was trending more toward biology, my dad took me up to Franklin and I started to become a rockhound. I spent time working 3M quarry in Belle Meade there through high school and college and managed to find some interesting specimens. I went off to college and pursued a pre-med curriculum, hoping to get into medical school. I spent a year as a foreign student in Bregenz, Austria, and when I came back to the US I enrolled in Rutgers Univ. as a masters degree candidate in entomology (the study of insects). I did pesticide residue analyses and focused on insects that transmitted human diseases. The week I graduated from Rutgers with an MSc, I joined the Peace Corps and spent the next 3 years in Polynesia--The Tonga Islands and Western Samoa where I worked in their Ministries of Health & Agriculture. I also travelled to Fiji and New Zealand and married a Tongan-Samoan girl. Based on the epidemiology I did in Tonga, I was awarded a Public Health Service scholarship and enrolled as a PhD student at the Johns Hopkins Univ. in Baltimore. I continued to study and do research on tropical diseases transmitted by insects and spent 2 years in Liberia, West Africa doing a dissertation on river blindness. I recall being bitten by mosquitoes, tsetse flies, and black flies all in a days work. Mineral collecting was a thing of the past. I received a PhD from Hopkins and soon after was commissioned a LT in the USN. The Navy sent me to its premier overseas research lab, NAMRU-3, based in Cairo Egypt where the desert was littered with fossils and remnants of stone age villages, but most of my time was spent diving in the coral reefs of the Red Sea. The Navy assigned me to its medical lab in Jakarta, Indonesia where I focused on malaria drug and vaccine studies. The Navy pulled me back to the US in 2000 where I continued to do malaria lab and field studies. I was fortunate to spend extended periods of time working in Ghana (West Africa), and Peru (South America). Peru opened my eyes to the amazing beauty of minerals, and I started to bring specimens home that I bought from miners. I visited the Montgomery County mineral show back in 2011 and met Fred Parker who started to get me excited about mineral collecting in MD, PA, & VA. I think I joined the GLMSMC in 2012. I was already a microbiologist and soon realized that the majority of the earth's 6-7000 mineral species can be visualized by a microscope. As a result I joined the Micromineralogists of the National Capital Area (MNCA) in 2013. I retired from the USN in 2014 and worked for a short time as a consultant. I love field collecting minerals and fossils and I love travelling. My favorite minerals are the zeolites, many of which I personally collected during my time working in the 3M quarry in Belle Meade, NJ. My database lists 3350 mineral specimens, the majority of which are micromounts or thumbnail-size. I think I have over 1000 different mineral species, most of which are in their naturally occurring crystal forms.






