Casper has been building his trilobite collection and actively collecting the fossilized creatures in West Virginia. His knowledge of trilobites, along with the work of cleaning and procuring his self-collected specimens, are sure to impress!

For my message this month, I want to tell you about my recent trip (April 27-28) to Franklin, New Jersey, for the DVESS's Annual Superdigg at the Franklin Mineral Museum! As many of you know, I'm a Franklin mineral collector and this place is very close my heart!

I started my voyage that Friday morning and arrived in Franklin at the Littell Center, the site of the 47th Annual N.J. Earth Science Association Gem, Mineral, and Jewelry Show and Outdoor Swap. Here I set up my display of "Daylight" Franklin and Sterling Hill classics. As many of you know, Franklin is the fluorescent capital of the world, but many of you don't know that the Franklin and Sterling Hill Mines have some of the most unique and colorful minerals in the world!

The next day, I arrived at the Franklin Mineral Museum at 7:30 AM for registration and check-in. I signed up for 2 sessions of digging on the "Mill Site" pile. Sessions were 3 hours each and I signed up for the first from 9-12 and the third from 4-7 PM. Many of our own GLMSMC members were present and I really enjoyed having the chance to collect with them! I was fortunate to find some nice specimens of Hardystonite and Clinohedrite, some of Franklin's rarities. I also found a nice piece of Microcline and Meionite, which I learned is not very rare, but nonetheless a quite beautiful fluorescent mineral combo.

On Sunday, I spent most of the day at the Franklin Mineral Show. I planned to sell minerals at the outdoor swap, but unfortunately, the rain pretty much wiped out the outdoor sales. I was still able to make a few sales to friends and a few purchases as well. For the show and tell at May's meeting, I plan to bring a couple!

After the show was over, it was time for the take-down. As may of you know from our Montgomery show, this is a lot of work and all done by volunteers. Fortunately, we had a nice group to help with the take-down. We loaded everything up and took it to the Sterling Hill Mining Museum to be tucked away until the fall show. Afterwards, a group of us went to dinner for a very fitting end to the weekend!

SPEAKER: Mike Wise with his wonderful talk, "Pegmatites: Earth's Most Amazing Rocks!"

Pegmatites rarely occur as an isolated body; they usually occur in clusters in a well-defined area. They are found globally and are a great source of collectible materials and gem minerals, especially rare gems, though usually, they are not of gem quality. The most common minerals are beryl, topaz, tourmaline, spessartine, and spodumene. Industrial minerals are also common, such as quartz, muscovite, feldspar, and granite. Pegmatites do contain a diverse mineralogy—over 600 different minerals have been found in pegmatites. The big difference in minerals found in pegmatites versus those found in granite is that pegmatites have variable grain sizes within the same body as well as variable mineral chemistry, greater texture, and a greater chance to find rare minerals.



## **Field Trip News**

#### We have several field trips planned for this summer:

- 1) Sat. May 18th is the Sanders Warrenton Quarry from 8-11 AM: The address is 5485 Afton Lane, Warrenton, VA 20187. Plan to arrive at 7:30. Parking outside the gate is super tight, so press together as close as possible if the gate is not open yet, because there is no parking along the road and traffic is fast. Leave one lane open for quarry manager to get in. Very tough quarry with limited amount of crystallization; it's best for micro collectors. There are sparse pockets 1-3" in diameter, mostly of calcite and aragonite. I found one piece of prehnite... 6x4x4" rock that I broke apart to discover 2 small sphalerite crystals. Actinolite is present, usually in crumbly nodules and iron stained massive clumps, though I did find a nice bladed piece of the 30 or so I can across. (Text courtesy of Sam Linton.)
- 2) Sat. June 1st is the Vulcan Manassas Quarry: This is an invitational extended to us by our friends in the SoMD club. Please be there at 7:15 AM, we'll be out at 11:45 AM. Meet at the Vulcan Manassas Quarry office parking lot at 8537 Vulcan Lane, Manassas, VA. Children age 10 with full standard safety gear and parent are permitted. Standard safety gear means shatter-proof eye protection, helmet, steel toes, and long pants. Safety vest, gloves, water, sunscreen are all advised. Bring the signed, dated waiver with you when you show up and be prepared to give it to our host, Mr. KT Odem.
- 3) *Sat. June 8th is the Vulcan Stafford Quarry:* Meet at the office parking lot of the Vulcan Stafford Quarry at 100 Vulcan Quarry Rd., Stafford, VA. Adults only and collecting only on piles arranged on the floor of the quarry; no berm collecting. Standard safety gear means shatter-proof eye protection, helmet, steel toes, and long pants. Safety vest, gloves, water, sunscreen are all advised. Bring the signed, dated waiver with you when you show up and be prepared to give it to our Vulcan Stafford host. We are out at 11:45 AM. Make sure you label your tools and take home everything you came with.
- 4) Sat. June 29th is the National Limestone Middleburg Quarry, followed by the Mount Pleasant Mills Quarry for the rest of the day: Please be at the Middleburg office at 8:30 AM. Meet at the office parking lot of National Limestone Quarry #1, at 3499 Quarry Road, Middleburg, PA 17842. We will sign in and get a safety brief from our host, Mr. Eric Stihl, and will work this quarry for 2 hours, then go over to National Limestone Quarry #2 at 217 Quarry Rd, Mount Pleasant Mills, PA 17853. Children age 10 with full standard safety gear and parent are permitted. Standard safety gear means shatter-proof eye protection, helmet, steel toes, and long pants. Safety vest, gloves, water, sunscreen are all advised. Bring the signed, dated waiver with you when you show up and be prepared to give it to our Vulcan Stafford host.

# Vulcan Manassas Quarry March 30, 2019 Field Trip Report with Pictures

We kicked off the new year with a well-attended field trip to the Vulcan Manassas Quarry. We had a beautiful day and over 25 people show up at 7:30 am with their signed and dated waivers, rules, and standard safety gear. Our host, Mr. KT Odem, took us down to the 6th bench and from there, collectors spread out in every direction. I took interest in some vuggy rock that gave me several small specimens of mordenite, chabazite, calcite, and pyrite. I think there might also be a tiny book of hematite in one of these vugs. The mordenite resembles spiky white puff balls and is so soft and lightly attached to the rock that I ruined several specimens trying to break the rock down from bowling ball to hand size. There was also some interesting fine grained pink and olive green feldspar rock at this site that some of us took home for possible lapidary work; cabs or spheres might turn out well.

The 6th bench inside berm looked about the same as it did when we visited here last fall, so I shifted over to the outside berm and found a collection of large (room-size) boulders that hosted fine druzy crystals of what we all thought was calcite. A small chisel was perfect for harvesting some of this stuff, which came off mostly in small micro and thumbnail sized pieces. Under the loupe, it was a collection of opaque white calcite rhombs sitting on top of a mixture of sparkling clear stilbite and apophyllite crystals. It was dirty with road dust, but it cleaned up well. I was surprised that the calcite crystals lit up well—bright white—under both short and long wave UV. This is the first time I had seen calcite from the Manassas quarry fluoresce white; all my other finds over the years had been pale yellow or orange, but only under short wave UV. I looked up from chiseling that calcite and saw a huge boulder with lots of crystals glinting in the sunlight, but it was 11:45 and there was not enough time to do anything except take a few photos.

Some of us gathered at the quarry office to compare notes and Dave Hennessey found some nice prehnite to investigate. On close examination, it looked like some other flaky mineral coating some of the prehnite...this turned out to be individual snowflake-like crystals of prehnite and flat, tiny black babingtonite xls coated on top and bottom with fine silvery-white actinolite hairs. This was the first time in all my trips to the Vulcan Manassas Quarry that I had ever seen babingtonite. Tiny but still way too cooool! I think I've been at least 10 times to Vulcan Manassas quarry and someone asked me why I/we keep going back. There have been lean times and rich times, but always something new and worth discovering.

#### From the south:


